



Michigan State AFL-CIO 2005- 2006 Voting Records of the Michigan Senate

1) Increase in Unemployment Benefits – Amendment to SB 171 (RC 05-14)

This vote is on a bill to stop employers from cheating on their unemployment taxes. The amendment would increase the maximum weekly benefit by \$30, when the state unemployment rate exceeds 5%. The maximum benefit has been frozen at \$362 since 2002. The vote is on whether or not the amendment was germane to the original bill.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

2) Extension of Unemployment Benefits – Amendment to SB 909 (RC 05-656)

SB 909 is a bill to cut taxes for businesses. This vote is on an amendment to that bill tying it to SB 185, which would extend unemployment benefits from 26 weeks to 39 weeks. If the state can cut taxes on businesses during this recession, then it also has a responsibility to help the unemployed until they can find new work.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

3) Ban on Rules Recognizing Unions – SB 1026 (RC 06-67)

The Granholm Administration is in the process of issuing rules to improve the conditions of adult foster care group homes. These rules will reduce employee turnover by requiring that these homes pay their workers a decent wage. The rules would allow the presence of a collective bargaining agreement to serve as evidence that wages are fair. This bill will prevent the rules from recognizing a collective bargaining agreement as evidence of compliance with a rule.

A “NO” vote is a right vote.

4) Tax Break for Wal-Mart – SB 175 (RC 05-530)

SB 175 would allow government to subsidize stores like Wal-Mart when they build new distribution centers. Wal-Mart builds their warehouses and distribution centers where they are needed, regardless of whether they receive tax breaks from the community.

A “NO” vote is a right vote.

5) Tax Dollars for Wal-Mart – SB 434 (RC 05-112)

This bill would allow Wal-Mart to qualify for a state transportation grant to make road improvements for a proposed new distribution center in Mount Pleasant. Wal-Mart earned \$10 billion in profits last year. They don't need the taxpayers to pay for their distribution centers.

A “NO” vote is a right vote.

6) Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) – Amendment to SB 909 (RC 05-654)

The EITC provides a tax credit for low income wage earners. The federal EITC helped move more working families out of poverty than any other government program. SB 453 would create a 10% state EITC, like 18 other states have enacted. This vote would tie SB 453 to the business tax cut bill SB 909. If the state can afford to give business tax cuts, then it can also afford a tax credit to help lift the working poor out of poverty.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

7) School Employees Health Benefit Act - SB 896 (RC 05-640)

This bill was the main bill in a package of legislation that was proposed by AFT-Michigan and IUOE Local 547 to help reduce health care costs for public school employees. This proposal was created in response to Republican efforts to cut health benefits for school employees. It would create a statewide catastrophic stop loss pool and would allow small school districts to self insure by forming purchasing pools. These measures would save school \$156 million in the first year alone.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

8) Unemployment Tax Cheating by Employers – Amendment to SB 171 (RC 05-12)

SB 171 was a bill to stop a form of employer unemployment tax cheating where the employer transfers their employees to a new company as a means of paying a lower unemployment tax and thus cheating the system. This vote is on an amendment that would close a huge loophole where employers contract with a Professional Employer Organization to handle their hiring and payroll. Often the PEO becomes the employer and thus the true employer does not pay their fair share of taxes.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

9) Child Labor Laws – SB 179 (RC 05-54)

The business community has been trying for years to increase the number of hours that 16 and 17 year olds can work during the school year. This bill would increase the number of hours by 2 to 7 hours a week for most students. This is time that is needed to be spent on their studies to prepare them for the hi-tech, high skill workforce of the 21st century.

A “NO” vote is a right vote.

10) No Tax Dollars to Fight Unions – Amendment to SB 1026 (RC 06-66)

SB 1026 was an anti-union bill to prevent state rules from recognizing collective bargaining agreements as proof of compliance with a rule. This vote is on an amendment that would tie SB 1026 to HB 5189, which would prevent any state tax money from being used to deter or oppose a union representation campaign.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

11) Workplace Ergonomics Rules – HB 5447 (RC 06-22)

Repetitive motion injuries account for 50% of all workers’ compensation claims in Michigan. These are injuries that can be prevented. Businesses who have voluntarily implemented an ergonomics program are seeing a tremendous savings as a result of fewer injuries and less days away from work. An advisory committee in MIOSHA, made up of representatives of business and labor, is currently working to develop an ergonomics rule that would apply to all businesses. This bill would have stopped the work of the ergonomics committee and would have prevented MIOSHA from being able to implement any rule dealing with workplace ergonomics. Governor Granholm vetoed the bill and the committee is expected to issue a recommendation after the election.

A “NO” vote is a right vote.

1) Increase in Unemployment Benefits – Amendment to HB 4188 (RC 05-36)

HB 4188 was a bill to provide for a property tax deferral for certain senior citizens. This vote is on an amendment to raise unemployment benefits for those who do not earn the maximum benefit. Benefits for those not at the maximum has not been increased in many years.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

2) No Reason Absentee Voting – Amendment to HB 4569 (RC 05-64)

This bill was a bill to allow voters to vote early at their city or township clerks office prior to an election. This amendment would allow all voters to vote from the convenience of their home by absentee ballot. Currently only those who are over 60, disabled, or who are going to be out of town on election day can vote by absentee ballot.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

3) Fair Share Health Care Tax – Amendment to HB 4342 (RC 05-645)

Wal-Mart is the worlds largest corporation earing \$10 billion a year in profits yet they fail to provide their workers with adequate benefits and wages. Many of their employees qualify for Medicaid, costing Michigan taxpayers an estimated \$23 million a year. HB 4342 was a bill to cut taxes on business. This vote is on an amendment to tie that bill to SB 734, which would impose a tax on large employers like Wal-Mart that rely on the state to provide health insurance for their employees. The

revenue would be applied to Medicaid for the services used by the company’s uninsured employees.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

4) Tax Break for Wal-Mart – SB 175 (RC 05-518)

SB 175 would allow government to subsidize stores like Wal-Mart when they build new distribution centers. Wal-Mart builds their warehouses and distribution centers where they are needed, regardless of whether they receive tax breaks from the community.

A “NO” vote is a right vote.

5) Stop Outsourcing – Amendment to HB 5461 (RC 05-731)

HB 5461 was a bill to reform the Single Business Tax. This vote is on an amendment to prohibit tax breaks for companies that outsource jobs from Michigan or who contribute to the outsourcing of jobs from Michigan.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

6) Protecting Pensions – Amendment to HB 5461 (RC 05-733)

This amendment would prohibit tax breaks from going to companies that cheat their employees by violating federal pension laws.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

7) Stopping Canadian and Out-of-State Trash - HB 4758 (RC 05-127)

This bill would raise the dumping charge for waste deposited in Michigan landfills to \$7.50 per ton in an effort to slow down the rise in Canadian and out of state trash and to increase recycling in the state. This vote was to discharge the bill from committee so that it could be considered by the House.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

8) Lower Prescription Drug Costs – Amendment to HB 4342 (RC 05-642)

HB 4342 was a Single Business Tax Cut bill. This vote is on an amendment to tie that tax cut to HB 4529, which would require the Department of Community Health to negotiate drug discounts with drug companies. This would lower the cost of prescription drugs in Michigan.

A “YES” vote is a right vote.

9) Child Labor Laws – SB 179 (RC 06-83)

The business community has been trying for years to increase the number of hours that 16 and 17 year olds can work during the school year. This bill would increase the number of hours by 2 to 7 hours a week for most students.
